PRESENTERS <u>KIM OWENS</u>

Kim is a blogger, influencer, writer, parent-mentor, speaker, and braille transcriber. She's also a wife, and the mother of two adult children. Her youngest son, Kai, unexpectedly lost his sight at the age of ten. After immersing herself in the blindness community and advocating for his equal and accessible education, she emerged with a strong perspective to share. She believes that parental acceptance, community building, and equal accessible education are the three main pillars that led to her son's success. She also says that disabled children's needs are not specialaccess and inclusion are rights protected by law. The content she creates appeals to parents of blind and disabled children, disabled adults, medical professionals, business owners, and educators. Kim is chronically ill with an autoimmune disease trifecta and spends her free time allowing her body and nervous system to heal by walking on the Georgia coast, collecting fossilized shark teeth, practicing

mindfulness, and playing with her fur-monsters.

KEN DOCKTER

Coordinator of Adult Services, North Dakota Vision Services/School for the Blind: Mr. Dockter is the coordinator of Adult Services. He received his elementary education degree and certification in Education of Vision Impairment from the University of North Dakota. He is also certified in Orientation & Mobility and has a Masters in Rehabilitation for the Blind from Northern Illinois University. Mr. Dockter specializes in daily living skills (DLS) instruction and provides services and support through short-term programs and outreach to individuals with visual impairments across North Dakota.

QUINCIE MATTICK

Ouincie attended public school in North Dakota until the end of her 7th grade year, in a small town right outside of Minot. She moved to Colorado and started her 8th grade year at the Colorado School for the Deaf and the Blind in Colorado Springs. While she lived in North Dakota, she participated in the short-term programming offered by the North Dakota Vision Services/School for the Blind beginning in 2nd grade. Quincie learned braille at a young age and used a white cane until she was 17. She got her first guide dog, Tessa, from The Seeing Eye in New Jersey. Quincie was a member of the paralympic team for USA Judo for a few years while in high school in Colorado. With this she traveled to several different countries and really got to experience the world. Quincie's hobbies include judo, goalball, listening to audio books, listening to music, baking, spending time with friends at college through Chi Alpha, a campus ministry group and connecting with various blindness groups online.

GWYN MCCORMACK

Gwyn is an award winning educator with a specialism in vision impairment. She founded Positive Eye in 2008 to provide practical courses and a product range of resources for practitioners working with children with VI. Positive Eye has developed to work nationally and internationally. Gwyn uses her years of experience as a Qualified Teacher of VI (QTVI) and Head of Service to deliver creative approaches, within practical frameworks, equipping educators with practical skills to support children. She has taken the lead role on the Qualified Teacher of VI course - University of South Wales, contributed to the University of Birmingham QTVI course and participated in European projects. She has trained 1,000 of professionals, travelling to and presenting online to 12 countries to date. She is currently collaborating with 27 States (USA) to bring a successful model of literacy to life: The Story Time Show' strengthening the literacy outcomes for 100's of children with complex learning needs - the impact is immeasurable.
